Berlin crisis.

On the night of 13-14 August 1961, East German police and military units sealed off all arteries leading to West Berlin. The communists pulled up train tracks and roads, erected barriers topped with barbed wire, completely isolating the Western sectors and preventing East Germans from escaping to the West. The fences and barricades completely surrounded the 97 miles around the three western sectors and 27 miles that cut through the heart of the city, dividing it (United States 2011).

 - MID start date: December 5, 1950. The Dutch battalion arrives at the front and participates in “The Christmas Offensive” which was meant to counter the gains made by the Chinese and North Korean forces (Ministry of Patriots & Veterans Affairs, The Republic of Korea 2010, chapter 5).
 - Although the Netherlands committed less than 1,000 troops to Korea (approximately 850), there were 120 Dutch battle deaths (Ministry of Patriots & Veterans Affairs, The Republic of Korea “Korean War Statistics”).
- 212 LUX
 - MID start date: April 22, 1951. The Luxembourg MID start date is the Battle of Imjin River. The LUX forces were attached the Belgian forces and fought with the UN forces through the end of the war (Ministry of Patriots & Veterans Affairs, The Republic of Korea “Korean War Statistics”).
 - MID end date: April 21, 1953. The last battle the Luxembourgian forces took part of was the Battle of Kimhwa Jatgol (also known as the Battle of Chatkol (Ministry of Patriots & Veterans Affairs, The Republic of Korea “Korean War Statistics”).
 - Highest Action: Attack
 - Fatalities: Luxembourg contributed 44 troops and suffered 3 battle deaths.

 - MID start date: December 9, 1950. Royal Hellenic Battalion infantrymen arrive in Pusan.
- 560 SAF
 - Add to MID
 - MID start date: November 19, 1951. The first sortie flown by SAF pilots targeting North Korean forces (McGregor 1978).
 - MID end date: Last incident against North Korean and Chinese forces as July 23, 1953 (McGregor 1978).
 - Highest Action: Attack
 - Fatalities: South Africa contributed 826 troops (mostly pilots) and suffered 34 battle deaths.
- 800 THI
 - MID start date: November 7, 1950. Thai frigates HMTS Prasae, Bangpakong, and transport Sichang arrive in Pusan.
